

Programs & Events

The Water Quality Forum, established in 1990, is a cooperative network of agencies, nonprofit organizations and citizens who have worked for over 25 vears to improve the health of the waterways in East Tennessee in accordance with the goals of the Clean Water Act.

The Forum initiates or participates in these projects and activities:



Families in the Creek

brings families into their local creek for a morning of educational activities about fish, wildlife, and water quality.



WaterFest

is a day-long festival at ljams Nature Center for area students that focuses on environmental and water quality education and outdoor activities.

Classroom Collaborations

with local science classes to teach students about water quality and strengthen their connections with local waterways.



Rain Barrel Workshops

teach community members how to build and use their own rain barrel and inform them about water conservation.



Adopt-A-Stream

recruits volunteer groups to adopt local streams. Adopting groups are taught clean up and monitoring techniques.

RiverRescue

has organized over 600 volunteers each year since 1990 to participate in a one-day cleanup of public shorelines along the Tennessee and Clinch Rivers in Knox and Anderson Counties.
